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Devon Energy partners with Wyoming Office of State Lands and Investments, Bureau of Land Management and Wyoming Conservation Corps for 10-day training, education and conservation project focused on sage-grouse habitat preservation in Wind River Basin

CHEYENNE, Wyo. – Wyoming Conservation Corps (WCC) recently volunteered alongside Wyoming Office of State Lands and Investments (OSLI) and Bureau of Land Management (BLM) staff members for a 10-day conservation and resource-management project sponsored by Devon Energy in the Wind River Basin. The program ran from July 27 – Aug. 5 and focused on Coyote Gulch, where University of Wyoming students, OSLI and BLM Lander Field Office employees implemented a riparian enhancement project, which entailed fencing off unstable portions of the system. Their combined efforts helped to preserve the health and value of the ecosystem within a core sage-grouse habitat, where elk, deer and pronghorn also live.

The goal of the partnership is to help preserve and protect public and state lands while providing University of Wyoming students with hands-on learning about Devon’s enhanced oil recovery project in Fremont County, the diversity of management activities handled by the OSLI, as well as energy development throughout Wyoming. This summer marked the eighth year Devon has sponsored the WCC in support of a series of preservation, restoration and education projects in Wyoming. In mid-August, Devon will also partner with the BLM and WCC on a 10-day conservation project in the Powder River Basin.

"This is the 8th year that Devon Energy has directly supported the growth and development of the Wyoming Conservation Corps, its members and Wyoming’s natural resources," said Patrick Harrington, assistant director for the WCC. "Through our partnership with Devon, the Office of State Lands and Investments, and Bureau of Land Management, WCC members are introduced to the complex nature of natural resource management and the balance we must strike to protect the environment while advancing the energy industry throughout Wyoming."

Devon also hosted its annual education day in the Wind River Basin for WCC students, which included a field tour of Devon’s enhanced oil recovery project in Fremont County and classroom discussion about energy development throughout the state. Fremont County commissioners, the Wyoming County Commissioners Association, the OSLI and The Nature Conservancy also participated.

"Devon Energy is dedicated to operations excellence and environmental stewardship in Wyoming and everywhere we do business," said Bill Skelton, Devon’s senior superintendent of production for the Wind River and Bighorn basins. "We are proud of our long-standing partnership with the WCC, BLM and OSLI to preserve and protect public and state lands."
